# Poor Families in Indiana Are Hit Harder by the Income Tax Than Those in Most Other States

Indiana's 2001 income tax threshold — the income level at which families begin paying income tax:

Ranking among 42 states with income taxes

For two-parent families of four: \$9,500.

3<sup>rd</sup> lowest

For single-parent families of three: \$9,000.

4th lowest

#### Indiana's 2001 income tax on working-poor and near-poor families:

riger (	For families of four with incomes at the poverty line (\$18,104): \$378.	4 <sup>th</sup> highest
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For families of three with *incomes at the poverty line (\$14,129)*: **\$276**. **4**<sup>th</sup> **highest** 

For families of three with *minimum-wage earnings* (\$10,712): **\$116**. **4**<sup>th</sup> **highest** 


For families of three with *incomes at 125% of poverty line (\$17,661):*\$396.

For families of four with *incomes at 125% of poverty line (\$22,630):* **531. 7 th** highest

#### Despite progress, Indiana continues to tax families with incomes below the poverty line.

- Indiana's tax threshold for families of four more than doubled in 1997, but a substantial gap remains between the threshold and the poverty line.
- In 1991, a family of four owed tax when its income exceeded 22 percent of the poverty line. By 2001, Indiana's tax threshold rose to 52 percent of the poverty line.
