## Poor Families in Arkansas Remain Subject to the Income Tax

Arkansas's 2004 income tax threshold — the income level at which families begin paying income tax:

Ranking among 42 states with income taxes

⇒ For single-parent families of three: \$13,000.

10<sup>th</sup> lowest

⇒ For two-parent families of four: \$15,500.

10<sup>th</sup> lowest

#### Arkansas's 2004 income tax on working-poor and near-poor families:

⇒ For families of three with *incomes at the poverty line (\$15,071)*: **\$37. 13**<sup>th</sup> **highest** 

⇒ For families of four with *incomes at the poverty line (\$19,311)*: **\$403. 5**<sup>th</sup> **highest** 

⇒ No tax on families of three or four with *minimum-wage earnings* (\$10,712).


For families of three with *incomes at 125% of poverty line (\$18,839):* **5**<sup>th</sup> **highest** 

For families of four with *incomes at 125% of poverty line (\$24,139):* **5**<sup>th</sup> **highest** 

### Arkansas has consistently taxed families with incomes well below the poverty line.

- Arkansas's tax threshold for families increased substantially in 1998, but has not been increased since then. In 1991, a family of four owed tax when its income exceeded 77 percent of the poverty line. For 2004, Arkansas's tax threshold is 80 percent of the poverty line.
- Since 1994, Arkansas income tax on a family of four with poverty-level income has risen by \$189, an increase of 48 percent after taking inflation into account.
