INCOME INEQUALITY HAS INCREASED IN MARYLAND SINCE THE 1970s

Inequality has increased in Maryland over the past two decades. This can be observed by ranking all Maryland families according to their income level, dividing them into five groups (or fifths) of equal size, and calculating the average income of each fifth of families. This analysis shows by the late 1990s:

- The richest 20 percent of families had average incomes 8.6 times as large as the poorest 20 percent of families.
- The richest 20 percent of families had average incomes 2.7 times as large as the middle 20 percent of families.

The Long-Term Trend

Since the late 1970s, income inequality has increased in Maryland. The economic growth of the 1980s and 1990s was not shared evenly among the poor, the rich, and the middle class. Instead, the top fifth of families fared substantially better than other income groups.

In the late 1970s, the richest 20 percent of families had average incomes 6.9 times as large as the poorest 20 percent of families. By the late 1990s, that ratio had grown to 8.6.

- The average income of the poorest fifth of families increased by \$3,620 between the late 1970s and the late 1990s, from \$17,290 to \$20,910.
- The average income of the middle fifth of families increased by \$12,680 between the late 1970s and the late 1990s, from \$53,160 to \$65,840.
- The average income of the richest fifth of families increased by \$60,840 between the late 1970s and the late 1990s, from \$119,960 to \$180,800.

The Recent Trend

Over the past decade, income inequality has remained about the same in Maryland.

- The average income of the poorest fifth of families increased by \$3,540 between the late 1980s and the late 1990s, from \$17,370 to \$20,910.
- The average income of the middle fifth of families increased by \$6,890 between the late 1980s and the late 1990s, from \$58,950 to \$65,840.
- The average income of the richest fifth of families increased by \$45,510 between the late 1980s and the late 1990s, from \$135,290 to \$180,800.

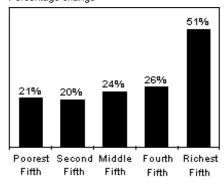

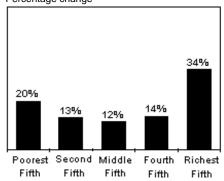
