

>	Federal Tax Changes: Recently enacted federal tax cuts reduce state revenue directly.	\$10 million
>	Remote Sales: States cannot collect sales taxes on goods & services purchased over the Internet due to federal law and court decisions.	\$0
>	Internet Access: States are generally prohibited from applying tax to Internet access charges.	\$0
>	Unfunded Mandates: Federal government imposes responsibilities on states but provides insufficient funding.	\$268 million
>	Medicare/Medicaid Dual Eligibles: Increased use of prescription drugs shifts costs of health care for low-income elderly from federal Medicare program to state Medicaid programs.	\$45 million
>	Federal Fiscal Relief: Congress approved temporary grants in 2003.	(\$73 million)
