
Federal Policies Affect North Carolina Revenue and Spending Levels, 2002-2005		Cost to North Carolina
>	Federal Tax Changes: Recently enacted federal tax cuts reduce state revenue directly.	\$49 million
>	Remote Sales: States cannot collect sales taxes on goods & services purchased over the Internet due to federal law and court decisions.	\$1.4 billion
>	Internet Access: States are generally prohibited from applying tax to Internet access charges.	\$113 million
>	<i>Unfunded Mandates</i> : Federal government imposes responsibilities on states but provides insufficient funding.	\$1.9 billion
>	Medicare/Medicaid Dual Eligibles: Increased use of prescription drugs shifts costs of health care for low-income elderly from federal Medicare program to state Medicaid programs.	\$1.0 billion
>	Federal Fiscal Relief: Congress approved temporary grants in 2003.	(\$552 million)
