

Federal Policies Affect New York Revenue and Spending Levels, 2002-2005		Cost to New York
	<i>Federal Tax Changes</i> : Recently enacted federal tax cuts reduce state revenue directly.	\$1.1 billion
	<i>Remote Sales</i> : States cannot collect sales taxes on goods & services purchased over the Internet due to federal law and court decisions.	\$4.8 billion
\triangleright	<i>Internet Access</i> : States are generally prohibited from applying tax to Internet access charges.	\$363 million
	<i>Unfunded Mandates</i> : Federal government imposes responsibilities on states but provides insufficient funding.	\$5.8 billion
	<i>Medicare/Medicaid Dual Eligibles</i> : Increased use of prescription drugs shifts costs of health care for low-income elderly from federal Medicare program to state Medicaid programs.	\$2.8 billion
\triangleright	Federal Fiscal Relief. Congress approved temporary grants in 2003.	(\$2.2 billion)
