

INCOME INEQUALITY HAS INCREASED IN OREGON SINCE THE 1970s

Inequality has increased in Oregon over the past two decades. This can be observed by ranking all Oregon families according to their income level, dividing them into five groups (or fifths) of equal size, and calculating the average income of each fifth of families. This analysis shows by the late 1990s:

- The richest 20 percent of families had average incomes 10.0 times as large as the poorest 20 percent of families.
- The richest 20 percent of families had average incomes 2.9 times as large as the middle 20 percent of families.

The Long-Term Trend

Since the late 1970s, income inequality has increased in Oregon. The economic growth of the 1980s and 1990s was not shared evenly among the poor, the rich, and the middle class. Instead, the top fifth of families fared substantially better than other income groups.

In the late 1970s, the richest 20 percent of families had average incomes 6.4 times as large as the poorest 20 percent of families. By the late 1990s, that ratio had grown to 10.0. This increase in inequality was the second greatest in the nation. The gap between the rich and the middle class also increased. This increase was the largest in the nation.

- The average income of the poorest fifth of families decreased by \$430 between the late 1970s and the late 1990s, from \$14,580 to \$14,150.¹
- The average income of the middle fifth of families increased by \$4,370 between the late 1970s and the late 1990s, from \$44,030 to \$48,400.
- The average income of the richest fifth of families increased by \$48,260 between the late 1970s and the late 1990s, from \$93,170 to \$141,430.

The Recent Trend

Over the past decade, income inequality has increased in Oregon.

In the late 1980s, the richest 20 percent of families had average incomes 7.0 times as large as the poorest 20 percent of families. By the late 1990s, that ratio had increased to 10.0. This increase in inequality was the second greatest in the nation. The gap between the rich and the middle class also increased. This increase was the largest in the nation.

- The average income of the poorest fifth of families decreased by \$980 between the late 1980s and the late 1990s, from \$15,130 to \$14,150.¹
- The average income of the middle fifth of families increased by \$3,220 between the late 1980s and the late 1990s, from \$45,180 to \$48,400.
- The average income of the richest fifth of families increased by \$35,830 between the late 1980s and the late 1990s, from \$105,590 to \$141,430.

¹The direction of this change is not statistically significant at the 95 percent level of confidence.

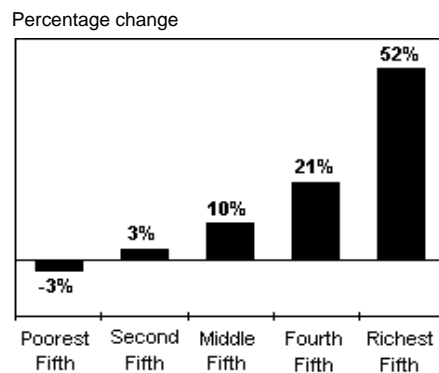

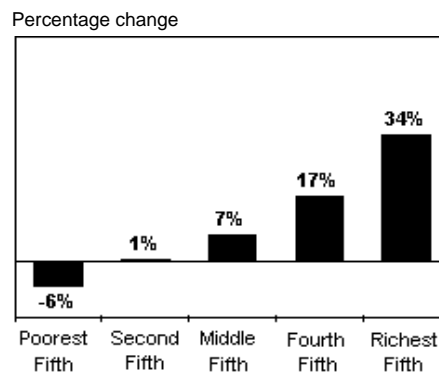
Income Changes for Oregon Families Late 1970s to Late 1990s, by Fifth of Families
