

INCOME INEQUALITY HAS INCREASED IN WISCONSIN SINCE THE 1970s

Inequality has increased in Wisconsin over the past two decades. This can be observed by ranking all Wisconsin families according to their income level, dividing them into five groups (or fifths) of equal size, and calculating the average income of each fifth of families. This analysis shows by the late 1990s:

- The richest 20 percent of families had average incomes 8.2 times as large as the poorest 20 percent of families.
- The richest 20 percent of families had average incomes 2.5 times as large as the middle 20 percent of families.

The Long-Term Trend

Since the late 1970s, income inequality has increased in Wisconsin. The economic growth of the 1980s and 1990s was not shared evenly among the poor, the rich, and the middle class. Instead, the top fifth of families fared substantially better than other income groups.

In the late 1970s, the richest 20 percent of families had average incomes 6.1 times as large as the poorest 20 percent of families. By the late 1990s, that ratio had grown to 8.2.

- The average income of the poorest fifth of families increased by \$550 between the late 1970s and the late 1990s, from \$16,840 to \$17,390.¹
- The average income of the middle fifth of families increased by \$9,410 between the late 1970s and the late 1990s, from \$47,150 to \$56,550.
- The average income of the richest fifth of families increased by \$38,920 between the late 1970s and the late 1990s, from \$102,940 to \$141,860.

The Recent Trend

Over the past decade, income inequality has increased in Wisconsin.

In the late 1980s, the richest 20 percent of families had average incomes 6.4 times as large as the poorest 20 percent of families. By the late 1990s, that ratio had increased to 8.2. This increase in inequality was the sixth greatest in the nation.

- The average income of the poorest fifth of families increased by \$350 between the late 1980s and the late 1990s, from \$17,040 to \$17,390.¹
- The average income of the middle fifth of families increased by \$6,590 between the late 1980s and the late 1990s, from \$49,970 to \$56,550.
- The average income of the richest fifth of families increased by \$32,580 between the late 1980s and the late 1990s, from \$109,270 to \$141,860.

¹The direction of this change is not statistically significant at the 95 percent level of confidence.

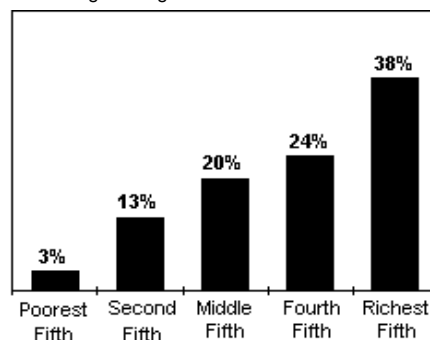

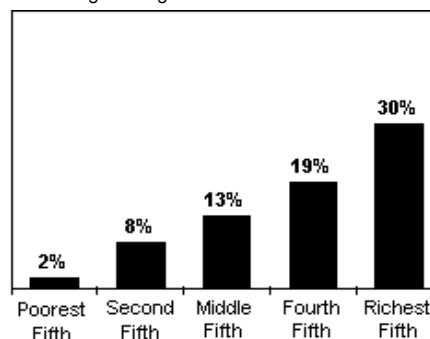
