Federal Policies Have Cost Connecticut \$2.1 Billion over the Past Four Years

Federal Policies Affect Connecticut Revenue and Spending Levels, 2002-2005

*Cost to
Connecticut*

- *Federal Tax Changes:* Recently enacted federal tax cuts reduce state revenue directly. \$198 million
- *Remote Sales:* States cannot collect sales taxes on goods & services purchased over the Internet due to federal law and court decisions. \$874 million
- *Internet Access:* States are generally prohibited from applying tax to Internet access charges. \$63 million
- *Unfunded Mandates:* Federal government imposes responsibilities on states but provides insufficient funding. \$726 million
- *Medicare/Medicaid Dual Eligibles:* Increased use of prescription drugs shifts costs of health care for low-income elderly from federal Medicare program to state Medicaid programs. \$490 million
- *Federal Fiscal Relief:* Congress approved temporary grants in 2003. (\$250 million)

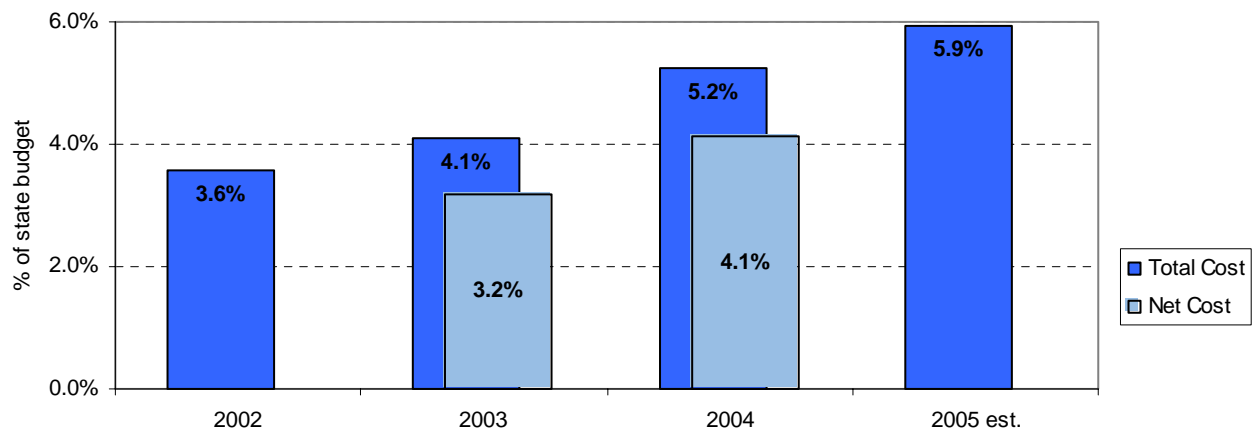
TOTAL COST (net of fiscal relief), 2002-2005: **\$2.1 billion**

Federal Policies Have Worsened Connecticut's Fiscal Problems

*Ranking among 50
states plus D.C.*

- Total cost as percent of General Fund budget (2002-2005): **4.8%** **47th**
- Net cost as percent of General Fund budget, including offsetting federal fiscal relief (2002-2005): **4.2%** **47th**
