

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) is the nation's most important anti-hunger program.

Whom Does SNAP Reach?

In Fiscal Year 2016, it reached:

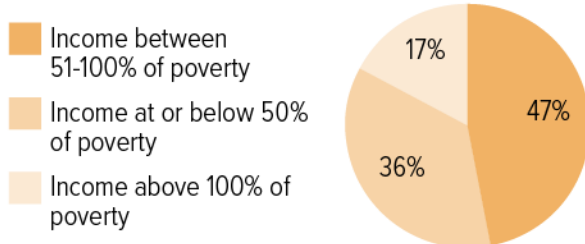
- **176,000** Nebraska residents, or **9%** of the state population (**1 in 11**)
- **44,219,000** participants in the United States, or **14%** of the total population (**1 in 7**)

Many Nebraska households struggle to put food on the table. The most recent data show:

- **14.8%** of households were “food insecure,” or struggled to afford a nutritionally adequate diet.
- **12.6%** of the population lived below the poverty line.
- **16.3%** of children lived below the poverty line.
- **7.4%** of elderly lived below the poverty line.

SNAP reaches needy populations: 77% of eligible individuals participated in SNAP in Nebraska in 2014, and **74%** of eligible workers participated.

SNAP kept **34,000** people out of poverty in Nebraska, including **16,000** children, per year between 2009 and 2012, on average. (These figures adjust for households' underreporting of benefits.)

What Benefits Do SNAP Recipients Receive?

SNAP targets benefits according to need. Very poor households receive more SNAP benefits than households closer to the poverty line since they need more help affording an adequate diet.

Households receive SNAP benefits on electronic benefit transfer (EBT) cards, which can be used only to purchase food at one of the 260,100 authorized retail locations around the country, including 1,300 in Nebraska.



Average monthly SNAP benefit for each household member:

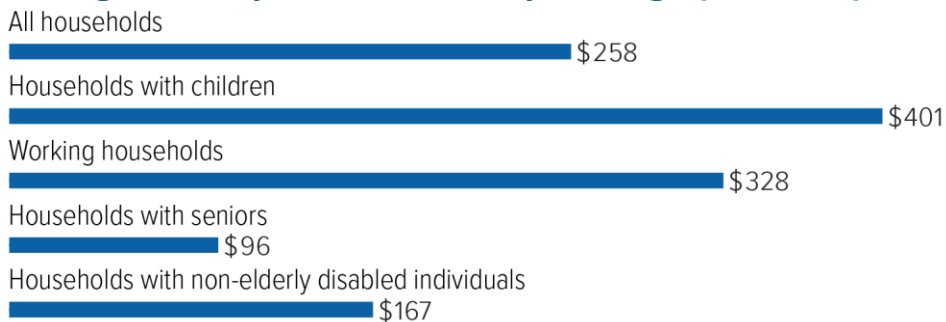

How Does SNAP Benefit the Economy?

Moody's Analytics estimates that in a weak economy, \$1 in SNAP benefits generates \$1.70 in economic activity.

SNAP benefits pumped about \$241 million into Nebraska's economy in 2016.

Notes: In addition to SNAP, in FY 2016, based on preliminary data, an average of about 1,400 individuals in Nebraska received benefits through the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), which is a federal program that provides commodity foods to low-income households, including the elderly, living on Indian reservations, and to Native American families residing in designated areas near reservations and in the State of Oklahoma.
